

Highlight of PLANE's Achievement at Midline

The PLANE Window 1 programme, led by DAI, recently reached its midline point after over three years of successful implementation in Nigeria. Thanks to the commitment and incredible support of our partners, the programme is creating real change, strengthening education systems and supporting more than 1.8 million learners (through direct and indirect interventions) to grow, thrive and stay on track for a brighter future. At midline, PLANE's learning assessments show meaningful gains in literacy and numeracy across the three states where the programme initiatives operate. Learners in Primary 4 are building solid skills, and teachers demonstrate improved competence in delivery.

- » In PLANE-supported schools:
 - a. approximately 56% of learners are now meeting or exceeding foundational literacy expectations
 - b. more than **80%** of learners are meeting or exceeding foundational numeracy expectations
- » Primary 4 children in PLANE-supported schools can read about 13.5 words per minute, compared with 3.8 words per minute in control schools

These results reflect steady progress in Kano, Kaduna and Jigawa as classrooms grow stronger and learners gain the confidence they need to succeed. Click the links to download our learning outcomes brief for each location.



Top Stories





n Thursday, 23rd October, the Federal Government of Nigeria, through the Federal Ministry of Education, unveiled a landmark initiative to equip teachers nationwide with zero-rated data access and subsidised devices for professional development and improved classroom delivery. Implemented with technical support from FCDO PLANE, this initiative reflects the government's commitment to advancing digital learning through the Education Public-Private Partnership (ePPP) framework.

At the pilot launch, the Minister of Education, Dr. Muruf Tunji Alausa, underscored the need for digital readiness in teaching. "We need our teachers to be 21st century compliant to impact students effectively," he said. The Minister also inaugurated a Coordination and Implementation Committee (CIC) to guide the rollout and foster collaboration among government, development partners, and private-sector stakeholders, including telcos and Internet Exchange providers.

Mr. Ian Attfield, Senior Education Adviser at the British High Commission, reaffirmed the UK's support for Nigeria's EdTech drive and called for scalable, locally adapted solutions to close access gaps and strengthen education equity.



Over 8,000 teachers across all six geopolitical zones will join the pilot from December 2025 to July 2026, accessing the Federal Government's eLearn platform and other digital resources at no data cost.

This scheme is a significant step toward a more inclusive and connected education system.

LANE has continued to support the Federal Ministry of Education (FME) in strengthening its role in education service delivery, including through technical assistance to the National Commission for Almajiri and Out-of-School Children Education (NCAOOSCE) in the development of the National Policy for the Enhancement of Almajiri Education in Nigeria.



PLANE supported and participated in a two-day national stakeholder workshop from 28th to 29th October 2025 at the Porto Golf Hotel, Kano, which brought together participants from State Ministries of Education, traditional rulers, Alarammas, and development partners.

The purpose of the workshop was to review and validate the draft policy in preparation for its presentation to the National Council on Education (NCE) scheduled for the 6th November 2025 in Ondo State.

As anticipated, at the NCE, the Federal Government approved the validated National Policy on Almajiri Education, marking a historic step toward inclusive learning and the formal integration of the Almajiri system into Nigeria's national education structure. Key provisions of the new policy include: harmonisation of curricula across Tsangaya schools; integration of literacy, numeracy, critical thinking, and skills acquisition; teacher training and stipends; improved funding and supervision; proper learner documentation and parental engagement; and minimum infrastructure and WASH standards.

In celebration of the 2025 World Teachers' Day, themed "Recasting Teaching as a Collaborative Profession," PLANE joined the Kaduna State Universal Basic Education Board and other partners to recognise 115 outstanding teachers across all 23 local government areas of the state.

At an event which held on Saturday,
October 4, 2025, the Kaduna State
Government honoured each top awardee
with a \text{\fits}500,000 cash prize and a plaque,
while the overall best teacher received two
plaques, two certificates, and \text{\fits}1,000,000.

All winners will also benefit from scholarships and soft loans to further their careers and strengthen the education sector. This celebration not only honours the dedication of teachers but also highlights the importance of collaboration in the teaching profession. Together, we are creating an environment where teachers are empowered, supported, and celebrated for their invaluable contributions.

he Federal Ministry of Education, with support from the PLANE programme, launched its Communications Strategy and Framework for 2025-2027 on September 30, 2025. The new strategy aims to strengthen communication across the Ministry's departments and agencies, promote transparency and ensure citizens are more effectively engaged.

At the launch in Abuja, the Minister of Education, Dr Maruf Tunji Alausa, described the strategy as a tool to tell Nigeria's education story "with clarity, credibility, and consistency."

He was joined by the Minister of State for Education, Professor Suwaiba Said Ahmad, who stressed that education reforms only succeed when they are clearly communicated, understood, and embraced by all stakeholders.

Delivering a goodwill message, Education Adviser at the British High Commission Abuja, Dr. Mikailu Ibrahim, noted that "communication is the bridge between policies and the people. This framework helps us build that bridge, and I can say with confidence that it has what it takes to deliver the Ministry's message effectively." Representing PLANE's National Team Lead, Deputy National Team Lead, Mr. Sam Achimugu, explained that PLANE's engagement aims to support the Ministry in aligning its communication structures with current reform priorities, while strengthening the visibility of education sector initiatives, whether led directly by government or in partnership with development actors.

Success Story: Islamiyya Attendees Embrace Kachako Community Learning Hub

s part of our recently documented success stories, we are pleased to share a community-driven transformation from Kachako Community Learning Hub, Kano State.

Once known for its resistance to Western education, Kachako is now home to a thriving PLANE-supported Community Learning Hub where over 200 children, including Almajiris, gather weekly to build foundational literacy and numeracy skills. This shift became possible through strong community advocacy and the remarkable support of Mallam Ibrahim Abubakar, an Islamic teacher who offered his own compound for the hub after embracing the value of combining Islamic and formal education.

The hub has helped reintegrate out-of-school children into regular schools and continues to inspire families to prioritise learning.
